It has become more popular across all regions and age groups, particularly amongst the over 65s and 16-24s. The most popular sectors of self-employment are hairdressing, domestic cleaning and shop keeping.

- •Control over the journey of the business to follow your passion
- •Support what's important to you in terms of business ethics and choice of suppliers/customers

Work/life balance

- •Set your own schedule around family/caring responsibilities
- •Freedom to take exercise and socialise when you choose

Flexibility

- ·Work wherever and whenever you want
- •Choose your own salary

Save money

- ·Less rush hour travel
- •No more uniform/meal deal lunches

Dynamic work

- Continuously adapting to different projects and clients
- Creativity is needed to expand your business

No office drama

- No distractions
- No difficult co-worker relationships

Downsides of being self-employed



Not everyone will experience all of the disadvantages below in their selfemployment journey, but it is important to consider them when weighing up whether to work for yourself or for someone else.

Lack of security

- No sick pay/holiday pay
- Unpredictable income

Isolating

- No co-worker motivation and social atmosphere
- · Difficult to focus

Increased stress

- More responsibilities and paperwork
- · Lack of support/help immediately avaliable

Potentially long working hours

- Business commitments can make more irregular working hours
- · Difficult to switch off

Starting from nothing

- Can be daunting and frustrating as you try to establish the business
- Need for start-up capital

Qualities needed to become self-employed

Self-employed people must have a range of competencies, including: values aligned with their business, 'soft' business skills (networking/communication), functional business skills (marketing/finance) and knowledge relevant to their field. Useful personal qualities include:

Determination

You must always keep in mind the reason why you started your business

Drive

You must be motivated by success in your field

Resilience

It can take a few attempts to succeed when you are starting out

Adaptability

Business can surprise you - you must be able to apply your skills to a variety of situations

Creativity

Imagination is needed to expand the business and overcome obstacles

Self-motivation

You won't have coworkers or managers to motivate you

Time management

You will be in charge of your schedule and have to juggle priorities

Passion

This will help you to stay motivated and 'sell' your business to clients

Initiative

You need to be a selfstarter and seize opportunities to develop the business
